## Committee hard at work drafting plans for new locals

The committee set up to oversee the merger of OLBEU and OPSEU is hard at work on a plan to create new OPSEU locals to serve LCBO employees.

It is no simple task. OPSEU groups its locals into seven regions across the province. In many cases, these regions cut across OLBEU zone boundaries. The new OPSEU locals will not cover the same area as the old OLBEU zones.

The creation of locals is a key step in the merger, said John Coones, Chair of the OPSEU Liquor Board Employees Division.

“Zones must be converted to locals so that these locals can qualify for funding,” he said. “Funding will give locals the tools they need to get up and running, get access to OPSEU resources, and serve our members better.”

Once completed, the Transition Committee’s proposal on locals will go out to all Division members for review and comment. A member assembly will be held to allow full discussion of the proposal and ideas for improvements to it.

Members of the Liquor Board Employees Division will be governed by the OPSEU constitution as of Jan. 1, 2006. The OPSEU Executive Board will debate and approve new locals shortly after that date.

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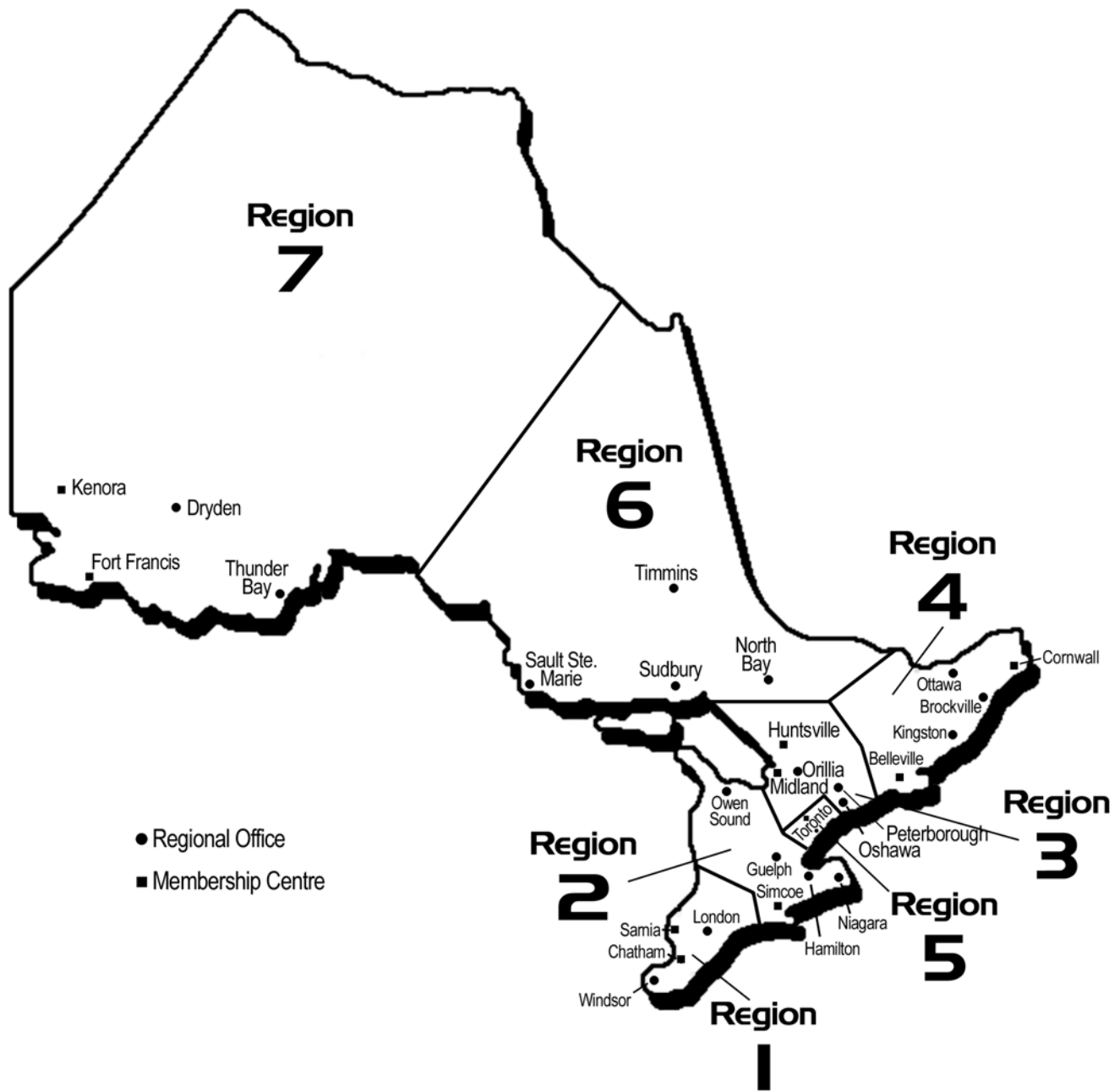


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## Getting to know your union

OPSEU groups its locals into seven regions, shown here. In addition to head office and 19 fully staffed and equipped regional office, the union operates 11 membership centres around the province, where locals can get access to computers, phone lines, fax machines, and meeting space for union business.
